



Registering an Out-of-State Vehicle in Hawaii

Moving to Hawaii or buying a vehicle titled in another state? Use this checklist to register your out-of-state vehicle through the Hawaii County DMV Offices.

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PRINTABLE CHECKLIST

Required checklist

- ☐ **Out-of-state title (properly assigned to you, if purchased)** **REQUIRED**
The existing title from the other state. If you purchased the vehicle, it must be signed over to you.
- ☐ **Government-issued photo ID (current Hawaii address)** **REQUIRED**
Most states require proof of residency to register a vehicle.
- ☐ **Proof of Hawaii address** **REQUIRED**
Utility bill, lease agreement, or other proof of current residency.
- ☐ **Proof of insurance meeting Hawaii minimum requirements** **REQUIRED**
Insurance from an insurer licensed in Hawaii.
- ☐ **Odometer disclosure statement** **CONDITIONAL**
Required if the vehicle is under 10 years old.
- ☐ **VIN verification (may be required)** **CONDITIONAL**
Some states require a physical VIN inspection by law enforcement or a DMV inspector.
- ☐ **Safety and/or emissions inspection (if required)** **CONDITIONAL**
Check whether your state requires an inspection before registration.
- ☐ **Payment for title and registration fees** **REQUIRED**

SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS

Inspection: Not specified — Inspection requirements vary by state. Check with the official state agency.

STEP-BY-STEP PROCESS

- 1 Establish residency in Hawaii (get a local address if you haven't).
- 2 Obtain the out-of-state title (properly assigned to you, if purchased).
- 3 Check whether Hawaii requires a VIN verification or safety/emissions inspection.
- 4 Complete any required inspections.
- 5 Submit the title, application, ID, proof of insurance, and fees to the state motor vehicle agency.
- 6 Surrender the out-of-state plates if required.
- 7 Receive your new Hawaii title and registration.

COMMON MISTAKES



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- Not completing a required inspection before going to the DMV.
 - Forgetting to update your driver's license to the new state (usually required within 30–60 days of moving).
 - Paying out-of-state registration while also owing taxes in the new state.
 - Bringing an incomplete title (missing buyer signature, odometer reading, etc.).
